- Nominees for the program award should demonstrate significant achievement in development of a unique and innovative learning resources/library program

ACRL is seeking nominees for the **Hugh C. Atkinson Memorial Award**. This award recognizes outstanding achievements (including risk-taking) by academic librarians who have contributed significantly to improvements in the areas of library automation, library management, and/or library development and research. This award honors the life and accomplishments of Hugh C. Atkinson, one of the major innovators in modern librarianship.

The nominee must be a librarian employed in one of the following during the year prior to application for this award:

- University, college, or community college library
- Non-profit consortium, or a consortium comprised of non-profits that provides resources/services/support to academic libraries

The nominee must have a minimum of five years of professional experience in an academic library or in a non-profit consortium or a consortium comprised of non-profits. Electronic submissions are required. Nominations must include documentation that indicates the name, address, and phone number of both the nominating party and the nominee as well as a narrative supporting the nomination, and a current vita. Nominators are encouraged to provide additional letters of support to assist the committee in understanding the full scope of the nominee's contributions.

News from the Field - Highlights from District 1

The **District 1** meeting was held at **Johnston Community College Library** on July 20, 2017

Breakfast served in the JCC Library Children's Room, including donuts, bagels, fruit, coffee, and juice. Each attending member gifted with a JCC "swag bag" courtesy of the marketing department.

District 1 was joined by District 4 Director, **Samantha O'Connor from Central Carolina** who presented on different methods of embedded librarianship that have been proven effective through a pilot at CCCC. Her presentation was later shared with the attendees as notes and supplemental information were recorded on the slides through extended discussion. From this presentation, discussion was sparked on creating our own pilot programs and Samantha offered her help and mentorship through the process. JCC has taken advantage of this.

Library news shared:

Johnston: Grant money spent creating and expanding YA fiction, popular fiction, and purchasing instructional materials, such as a SmartBoard.

Martin: Still converting Dewey to LC. Most of the main collection has been completed and will be followed by the Reference and NC Collections. A lot of Reference has been moved to general and then a signage audit will be completed.

Nash: Completing a lot of shelf reading as the books did not make it back on the shelves as nicely as was hoped after new carpet was installed. Got a mini grant from the college foundation to buy supplies for a makerspace to add to the 3D printer already in use.

COA Elizabeth City: Library in storage as they are reviewing bids for renovation.

COA Dare: Completing inventory. Demonstrated the Sirsi Mobile Circ app that is available, but there are many steps to be taken, like contacting John Wood to make configuration changes.

Wake Tech Health Science: Successful workshops for faculty and focusing on Early College students in information literacy sessions.

Wake Tech Southern (formally the Main Campus) **hired two Library Technical assistants Tami Armstrong and Grace Frenzel** (both UNC-G Library School students).

Wake Tech Northern hired Instructional Librarian Erik Sugg.

Trending this month -

Using your smartphone as your library card.

Question and Response:

"There is a lot of interest in this topic yet there hasn't been one response from anyone who might be doing this. Does this mean no one is doing this with smartphones, other than possibly [public libraries](#)?"

Print materials for accreditation.

Question: "We are moving to a new building next year and need to downsize our collection significantly. I would like to remove any print holdings that we have available online. My question to you is, have you ever heard of any programs requiring print materials for accreditation? I have looked through the accreditation requirements for many of our allied health programs, and so far there has been nothing about print specifically. I have contacted department heads and deans and have had little-to-no response."

Responses:

"We weeded in FY16 for a remodel and downsized our bound journals and reference collections. We have had a few accreditation site visits since, including ACEN and no negative feedback. I emphasize we have about 31k physical items, but access to approximately 200k ebooks/streaming media, plus the databases. I think the phrase for this is 'space reclamation'."

"We just went through the accreditation process for nursing. We have very few print nursing journals and as long as we were able to show them the wealth of periodicals available via our online databases they were happy-I created a handout for them with a list of our major online resources for nursing. We don't have CINAHL we have ProQuest Nursing and Allied Health and other ProQuest health databases and they were happy with that. I would be surprised if anyone

would require very much in the way of print journals for allied health. We do carry the Medical Asst. professional journal and the two main OTA journals in hardcopy but mostly our periodicals are online."

"Of all the visits we've hosted thus far, we have a boilerplate handout (tailored to the discipline) or a digital document listing selected resources by format. It is not my favorite product and I would love an alternative suggestion. Sometimes we get the whole team looking around; other times just one member. Physical reserves are of interest but anymore so much is also in the LMS or one of our streaming services. One topic that is always of interest (and seems to illicit approval) is how the students are using the physical space of the library. Nursing, Tech students, etc. have decidedly different study habits and information seeking behaviors compared to the general student population. Describing these seem to fascinate the accreditation teams. I have to admit it is intriguing."
